WATER AT THE HEART OF GEOPOLITICAL ISSUES



The 9th Water Forum, Dakar 2022, was opened by His Excellency Mr Macky SALL, on Monday 21 March 2022, at the Palais des Sports Dakar Arena in Diamniadio. In the presence of his counterparts from Ethiopia, Congo, Guinea-Bissau, Mauritania, the Vice-President of Gambia, the President of the World Water Council, Mr Loïc Fauchon, the President of the World Bank, and the Director-General of UNESCO.

In his speech, President Macky SALL recalled the threats linked to water scarcity, a source of conflict, and called for this issue to be placed at the heart of the international agenda. According to him, «this 9th World Water Forum gives us the opportunity to sound the alarm on the seriousness of the situation so that water-related issues remain at the heart of the international agenda. The lives and health of billions of people around the world are at stake. But also the preservation of international peace and security».

He recalled that «Senegal wishes to pursue its tradition of diplomacy, peace and consultation on water resources», stressing that this is the very meaning of its membership of two basin organisations: the Organisation for the Development of the Senegal River (OMVS) and the Organisation for the Development of the Gambia River (OMVG), created in 1972 and 1978 respectively.

According to him, the member countries of these two organisations «cooperate together in a concerted manner through activities but, above all, through common development infrastructures».

He added that this desire to follow the tradition of a diplomacy of peace and consultation on water resources is also reflected in Senegal's accession to the Convention on the Protection and Use of Transboundary Watercourses and International Lakes (Helsinki, 1992).

It is also in line with Senegal's initiative to include the theme «Water, peace and security» on the agenda of the United Nations

Security Council for the first time in April 2016, during his term at the head of this body.

«We wanted to contribute to international awareness of the high risks of water-related conflicts in the 21st century,» President Sall explained.

According to him, 25 years after its first edition in Marrakech, the World Water Forum is once again being held on African soil, while the scarcity of resources and environmental degradation continue to worsen. «A vital necessity and an economic need, water is, according to ancient wisdom, at the beginning and end of life,» he recalled.

President Macky SALL noted that according to the indicators of the United Nations report on water, published in March 2021, the situation is not reassuring, with two out of five people in the world living in areas where water is scarce.

«Women and girls spend more than 200 million hours a day fetching water. Two hundred million people are forced to consume polluted water and 80% of water is discharged into the environment without any treatment, putting the health and lives of 4.5 billion people at risk,» he lamented.

«90% of the most devastating natural disasters since 1990 have been water-related. There is every reason to believe that if nothing is done, the situation will get worse and worse, particularly because of high population growth, rapid urbanisation and polluting industrial activities,» warned President Macky Sall.

Concerted governance of transboundary basins, combined with the implementation of effective regulation systems and the promotion of a circular sanitation economy are levers to be activated in order to ease water-related tensions, Senegalese President Macky Sall stressed.

He also mentioned the promotion of a circular sanitation economy, through the treatment and recycling of wastewater in order to reduce the environmental and health impact and at the same time stimulate the creation of new income-generating activities.

For the Senegalese Head of State, the magnitude of the challenges to be met gives meaning to the various themes of the 2022 edition of the World Water Forum, which focus on «financing and governance mechanisms for drinking water in rural areas; scientific research to maximise the use of water and the reuse of waste water».

It is also necessary to promote the exchange of experiences and scientific and technological innovation that can help to optimise the use of water», he said.

At the same time, he encouraged state actors to maintain the momentum of Dakar in view of the United Nations Water Conference scheduled for 2023 in Dushanbe, Tajikistan.



OPENING CEREMONY: : LOIC FAUCHON CALLS FOR INNOVATIVE APPROACHES

«What an honor, what a pleasure, a joy that I cannot hide, to find this beautiful land of Senegal, where I was fortunate to travel many times in the past 40 years, from Podor to the Bassari Country, from Kidira to Touba». It is with these words that Loïc Fauchon, President of the World Water Council and co-organizer of the Forum, opened his speech at the opening ceremony.

Highlight on the four main points he mentioned, which will be the priorities this week in Dakar:

Securing the resource

«Innovate and innovate again: pump, transfer, desalinate, reuse » while «changing our habits, our behaviors» to consume better and less.

-The right to access to water in all constitutions

«It is necessary to provide a guarantee of free minimum allocation and a daily water supply», but also «to make this right opposable, by associating on this point the legislative, executive and judicial powers».

The financing of water.

Mr. Fauchon joins Senegalese President Macky Sall in his battle to cancel the water debt for the poorest states and communities. One condition, however: this measure should be associated with immediate in the construction of water and sanitation infrastructure.

Mr. Fauchon also mentioned a «Blue Fund», derived from climate financing, «a true International Fund for Water Security».

Governance

The World Water Council suggests the creation, during this Forum, of a Global Water Observatory for Peace, Development and Nature.



THE POINT



THE OMVS WINS THE HASSAN II WORLD WATER PRIZE

The Organisation for the Development of the Senegal River (OMVS), received on Monday, the Hassan II World Water Grand Prize, at the opening of the 9th World Water Forum at the «Dakar Arena» sports complex in Diamniadio.

The Moroccan Minister of Equipment and Water, Nizar Baraka, presented the prize to the High Commissioner of OMVS, Hamet Diane Séméga. It consists of a trophy, a certificate and a sum of 500,000 US dollars.

The Hassan II Great World Water Prize is «one of the most prestigious and globally recognised prizes», and «contributes to global awareness and encourages concrete action in favour of the water cause».

The prize pays tribute to His Majesty King Hassan II and «the strategic vision he brought to his country in terms of integrated and sustainable management of water resources to ensure its water security». This prize is awarded every three years during the World Water Forum.



WORLD REPORT: GROUNDWATER, BETWEEN CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

The Director-General of UNESCO, Ms Audrey Azoulay, handed over the World Water Development Report 2022 to the President of the Republic of Senegal, Macky Sall, on Monday 21 March 2022, during the opening of the 9th World Water Forum in Dakar. Coordinated by UNESCO, on behalf of the UN, the report is entitled: «Groundwater: Making the invisible visible».

According to Ms Azoulay, groundwater is, for example, 20 times more important in volume than lake water. But, she notes, although abundant and invisible, groundwater must be preserved from inappropriate use. To this end, the Unesco Director General advocates an international commitment to sustainable and equitable management of this vital resource. In her opinion, global cooperation at the UN level is the only solution to face the challenges and opportunities of water in general.

Mrs. Audrey Azoulay said that Unesco promotes the sharing of scientific data, know-how and life skills through information, education and awareness-raising.



A common good

«Groundwater constitutes nearly 99% of the world's total liquid freshwater supply and currently accounts for a quarter of all freshwater used by humans,» according to the 2022 edition of the United Nations World Water Development Report. The document, entitled «Groundwater: Making the invisible visible», describes the challenges and opportunities associated with the development, management and governance of groundwater around the world.

The report finds that «readily and freely accessible to many people, making it a common good, groundwater can bring enormous social, economic and environmental benefits to societies, and its contribution to meeting our water needs is immense.

The UN study states that globally, water use is expected to increase by 1% per year over the next 30 years. «The growing demand for water from all sectors is driven by population growth, changing consumption patterns and economic development,» it says.

Groundwater provides half of the water withdrawn for domestic use by the world's population, including drinking water supplied to the vast majority of the rural population, which is not served by public or private distribution systems, and about 25% of all water withdrawn for irrigation purposes, the report adds.

Use in figures

- Agriculture is responsible for 69% of the total volume of groundwater abstracted.
- Domestic uses account for 22% of the total volume of groundwater abstracted.
- Industrial uses account for 9% of the total volume of groundwater abstracted.
- Almost 50% of the world's urban population is now supplied by groundwater sources.
- In sub-Saharan Africa, only 5% of the land used for irrigation uses groundwater.

In the form of a video message: «This 9th forum is being held in Africa for the first time since the first forum held in Morocco a quarter of a century ago. Water plays an essential role in this continent where socio-economic development is rapid. The annual economic growth rate in Africa is over 3% and the urban population is about 3.6%, twice the world average. Hydropower production on the continent is expected to almost triple by 2040.

He added, «I hope that the discussions at this Dakar Forum, which is positioned as one of the main preparatory processes for the UN conference, will bring new impetus to the water agenda in Africa and the world to achieve our goal. These discussions will be taken further at the 4th Asia-Pacific Water Summit to be held in Kumamoto, Japan. I hope that this series of major preparatory events will lead to fruitful discussions and actions at the UN Water Conference in 2023».



“Contributing to the achievement
of the water-related MDGs”

What impact will the Forum have on improving access to water and sanitation in Africa and what are the prospects?

The 9th World Water Forum will focus on the global level (according to WHO 91% of the world's population uses an improved water source and 68% uses an improved sanitation facility, i.e. 9 points below the MDGs), but also with a strong African tone and a focus on sub-Saharan Africa (319 million people do not have access to a water source and less than 17% of the population has access to facilities, again according to WHO), where the challenges are the greatest and the populations the most deprived.

Although Senegal is one of the African countries that have achieved the MDG targets for water, the Emerging Senegal Plan aims to improve access to quality services at affordable and acceptable prices for populations living in urban and rural areas and to promote good governance in the sector.

Furthermore, at the mid-point of the progress made in the framework of the SDGs, the actions undertaken will aim to feed directly into the 2030 Agenda and contribute to the water-related SDGs, to take stock of the progress made and to identify areas where further efforts are needed to achieve the sustainable development goals. The Forum will also contribute to the realisation of the African Water Vision 2025 and the African Union's Agenda 2063.

What does Senegal have to gain by hosting the World Water Forum?

As the host country of the 9th World Water Forum, Senegal benefits from being recognised as a champion for water and sanitation issues more socially, politically and economically effective, and from strengthened relationships with other countries reinforcing its leadership. It will also benefit from the

economic benefits of the Forum

The preparation and organisation of the Forum also builds the capacity, awareness and knowledge of those involved in these processes, from the organising committee to government officials, from the media to universities.

For the Senegalese population, the World Water Forum also represents an opportunity to improve knowledge and change behaviours related to water and sanitation issues, and also to the solutions that exist elsewhere in the world. Awareness raising is the basis for development, so the impact on Senegal and its people will be of great value. The Forum will build the capacity of Senegalese youth (schoolchildren, high school students, students and young professionals) whose participation in the Forum is sponsored.

It should also be noted that the Forum is a catalytic instrument, particularly in the mobilisation of additional funding for the Senegalese water sector, with the support of the AfDB for a project to strengthen the resilience of water supply systems. Other major initiatives will be announced by Senegal's traditional partners.

The attractiveness of Senegal as a destination will thus be strengthened with effective economic and cultural spin-offs (thousands of international participants, hotels, visits to tourist sites and museums, cultural activities), the presence of most of the international press, etc. Senegal has everything to gain by organising the 9th Water Forum.

What motivated Morocco's participation in the Water Forum currently taking place in Dakar?

Morocco is one of the founders of the Forum. The first World Water Forum was organised in Morocco in Marrakech in 1997, under the high authority of the late King Hassan 2. The latter is at the origin of the great hydro-energy projects of Morocco. This strategy contributed to the good management and preservation of Morocco's water resources. Following him, King Mohamed 6 extended this strategy to projects for the desalination of sea water, water treatment and the integration of renewable energies, notably solar and wind energy.

Morocco is the initiator of the Hassan 2 Great World Water Prize, in conjunction with the World Council, a prize of 500,000 dollars (endowed entirely by Morocco), which is awarded to bodies, researchers, personalities, and organisations that have distinguished themselves in the field of water through technological innovations and initiatives aimed at preserving water resources in the world.

What are the expectations and perspectives related to Morocco's participation in the Forum?

Morocco is known to be a country that is very committed to environmental protection, as evidenced by the fact that it hosted COP 22 in 2016. For multiple reasons, Morocco is known for its global cooperation on issues related to water resources management. Morocco promotes water diplomacy and environmental protection. Present at all meetings, the Kingdom of Morocco is committed to universal access to water for all, whether those who have the most water give it to those who have less or none at all. Water is also a question of security, which is why Morocco has always been involved in the Forum's initiatives, right up to the highest levels of government, involving all the actors of civil society and the Moroccan private sector as well. Morocco remains open to alternative solutions for a better management of water resources.
