## **PRESIDENT MACKY SALL CONGRATULATES THE ORGANIZERS OF THE 9<sup>TH</sup> WORLD WATER FORUM**

The President of the Republic, Macky Sall, welcomed the organization of the 9th World Water Forum opened on Monday 21 March 2022, in Dakar. He expressed it this Wednesday, March 23, 2022, during the Council of Ministers held at the Palace of the Republic of Senegal.

According to the press release, the Head of State congratulated the Government, in particular the Minister of Water and Sanitation and the Minister of Foreign Affairs and Senegalese Abroad, the Executive Secretary of the 9th World Water Forum, as well as the President of the World Water Council for “the excellent organization of the meeting (which ends on March 26, 2022), especially the opening ceremony, rich in terms of messages, pleas and commitments.

Mr. Sall also addressed his “warm congratulations” to the Organisation pour la Mise en Valeur du Fleuve Sénégal (OMVS), winner of the Hassan II Grand Prize for Water.

In addition, President Sall thanked the Heads of State and Government, the heads of multilateral institutions, the experts of the sector and other participants, “who have enhanced by their presence the quality and success of this historic event that puts water issues at the center of the debates and the global development agenda.

Already, the Senegalese Head of State asks his Government to “ensure the implementation of the commitments of the Dakar Declaration; a forward-looking document, which outlines a consensual roadmap for strengthening the water sector in the dynamics of achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG6)”.



## AFRICAN MAYORS ROUNDTABLE: ACTION PLAN FOR WATER SAFETY



During the Cities, Local and Regional Governments Day, the OECD and the UCLG-Africa launched the Roundtable of African Mayors for Water Security, gathering 80 mayors, local and regional elected officials. The Roundtable seeks to support water policy dialogues and reforms towards the achievement of the United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, especially the SDG 6 on “clean water and sanitation” for all.

Mayors highlighted that climate change, urbanisation and population growth and migration will add further pressure on water resources in the African continent and that building capacity and mobilising finance is needed to make sure that drinking water and sanitation services are provided to all. Mayors and elected officials signed the Action Plan for Water Security that proposes concrete actions for local and regional governments to drive water security at all levels, towards the 10th World Water Forum to be held in 2024.

Institutional partners and cities from all over the world, such as Paris (France), Lausanne (Switzerland) and Daegu (Korea) reiterated the message that decentralised cooperation is key to building capacities. The “Water Merit Diploma” was awarded to the former OECD Secretary-General of the OECD, Angel Gurría, for playing an essential role in raising the international and African policy agenda on water. The Minister of Water and Sanitation of Senegal Serigne Mbaye Thiam concluded the Day by highlighting the importance of the Action Plan for Water Security in raising the voices of local authorities in the global debate and towards the UN 2023 Water Decade Conference.

# SIX STUDENTS FROM THE IA OF DAKAR WIN PRIZES



Six students from the dakar education academy (ia) were awarded on wednesday, at the end of a competition organized by the senegalese national sanitation office (onas) for the world water forum. The students from various schools were rewarded for their drawings on the topic of caring for the living environment with respect to sanitation works and sustainable development.

The competition was organized by onas, in partnership with the minister of education, through the dakar academy office. The first prize was won by penda sow, student at the omar ben khatab dia school in fass. The second prize was awarded to mohamed gueye from the kawsara fall school in guédiawaye. Mamadou abdoulaye sarr from pikine 7 school, mariama sylla from léopold angran school in dakar, codé diop from gorée school and eumeudi sow from malick diop school in thiaroye were also awarded a diploma, an envelope, and teaching materials for their drawings.

Onas also awarded a financial envelope to the omar ben khatab dia school in fass, winner of the first prize, for the rehabilitation of its toilets. Through this competition, onas wanted to “highlight this layer which is the future of tomorrow”. “In reality, we are doing what we can do, but thinking about the future generation is important,” explained its managing director babacar fall.

The drawings illustrate “what the students think” about sanitation, he said to the sanitation directors of mauritania and côte d’ivoire who took part in the award ceremony at the onas stand in the exhibition centre of the abdou diouf conference centre in diamniadio. The primary school students submitted drawings that reflected their relationship with their living environment.

For the director of sanitation, it was imperative to involve the young people in order to “see how they could be involved, so that they could make their contributions to the forum’s theme, which the organizers had intended to be a forum of responses. According to him, the students highlighted a behavioral problem in managing this scarce resource, water, both in terms of use and collection, as well as in all activities where water is involved.

“It is an awareness-raising activity for behavioral change with the contribution of students, especially for the preservation of sanitation facilities,” he said. The organization of the competition was a first which he intends to continue in order to “further involve” these young people in understanding the issues of water and sanitation. He recalled the fact that sanitation is made up of four parts, namely collection, transport, treatment with major innovations, and management of works.

For the school director, mouhamadou moustapha faye, co-opted by onas in the organization of the competition, the expertise in drawing and especially the competence in education for sustainable development makes the students react especially in front of the situations of living together and living in their environment. He welcomed “an awareness”, which leads to “relevant solutions” in their interrelations with the environment. According to him, this competition is also “a lifeline for drawing, which is currently the poor relation of education and which allows expressing feelings”. The various productions dealt with the preservation of infrastructures and water management. (Aps)

**“Morocco is working on other challenges to stay the course”**

What motivates your presence at the World Water Forum?

Many things: first, to come and discover Senegal, which is an honour for all Moroccans. Secondly, the importance of the subject addressed by the water forum. The effort that the host country has made in terms of water management, both in terms of drinking water and sanitation. The interest in exchanging, debating and listening to each other, knowing that water is a vital need for all human beings. The World Water Forum is an opportunity to share the different experiences and expertise around the theme of water and to leave this event with resolutions, partnerships and a desire to work together for humanity.

Can you share with us what you retained from this morning's session?

It was a very important session because it is the first time that it is addressed to local leaders to tell them that the mission of this service, which is water, is yours. I really appreciated the words of the President of the World Water Council who said that it is imperative to listen to local elected representatives. In other words, they must adhere to the national water policy and take charge of a large part of the mobilisation of both funds and human resources to make access to water one of the priorities. We have moved from the mission of distributing water to a more important mission which consists of thinking about how to ensure that with the current scarcity of water, climate change and drought which is becoming more and more prevalent. How to find ways to ensure the presence of water in a sustainable and equitable way for all citizens.

You come from Morocco, which is renowned for its water and sanitation management. How do you plan to share this experience with other African countries?

We are doing a lot of things at the level of the Moroccan government with the great will of His Majesty the late Hassan II, we have been able to have a policy of dams, a policy of implementation of several projects related to water management. Today things are changing, the ways of working on water have been changed because there are other realities, other challenges on which Morocco is working to stay the course. Some people say that giving water is a human right. Access to water must be ensured in a sustainable way, and consequently, with climate change, particularly drought, Morocco is facing a new challenge, a new reality, which is water scarcity. It will be necessary to review the issue of agriculture, which today takes up 80% of our water resources, and to review practices and new methods to enable Morocco to save all the water lost through optimal management.

**“In France, we have a very interesting financing mechanism with decentralized cooperation”**

*At which level is France participating in this water forum, the 9th edition, which is being held in Dakar, Senegal?*

France has prepared this forum with great care, with a delegation of 300 people with diverse profiles (researchers, parliamentarians, cooperation agencies, the AFD, elected officials, business associations, etc.). A specially designed program is planned at the French delegation's stand (Hall 2, N.E29), with the availability of the website, meeting activities, and continuous sessions on various water-related issues with linguistic support (French/English translation).

*What are the perspectives and what are the main topics for water diplomacy in the framework of the organization of this World Water Forum in Dakar?*

The water forum currently being held in Dakar has focused on these four themes: water security and sanitation, water for rural development, cooperation, «Tools and Means» raising issues related to the financing of the water sector, governance, management of intellectual resources, and innovations, themes that are global concerns, not only for Africa. We are facing a general crisis in the water sector, since the world's population's need for water is increasing exponentially.

*Where does France fit in to help with funding for the water sector?*

In addition to the efforts made in terms of coordinating actions at the global level, with very strong international cooperation, we have the AFD, the French Development Agency, and in France, there is a very interesting mechanism with decentralized cooperation that is already very active in Africa and in the world (the French regions and departments are involved). There is also structuring of mixed financing, combining public and private sources of financing. This form of financing allows private companies to invest alongside public actors.

## THE ERANOVE GROUP SHARES ITS EXPERTISE AND EXPERIENCE

The accessibility of water is an important issue and is becoming a priority for countries.

With the decline in rainfall for several decades, rising temperatures and the anthropization of watersheds (caused by agriculture, urban growth and gold panning), fewer and fewer people have access to water.

By participating in the 9th World Water Forum, the Eranove group, through its subsidiaries SDE (Sénégalaise Des Eaux) and SODECI (Société de Distribution d'Eau de la Côte d'Ivoire), wishes to share its expertise and experience.

The Eranove Group operates in several countries in the water, sanitation and electricity sectors. He has a multisectoral and international experience, which allows him to offer perfectly adapted solutions whether in urban or rural areas. Indeed, new models of facilitating access to services are proposed through innovative solutions.

Thus, on March 21, 2022, at the opening of the Forum, the stand of the Eranove group, premium partner of the forum, received the visit of President Macky Sall, as well as the registration of many requests and partnership requests.

The group headed by its Chief Executive Officer, Mr. Marc Alberola, wishes to share its expertise with forum participants through meetings, technical

sessions and panels on the following themes:

- Preservation of the resource
- Sanitation
- Maintenance of human-powered pumps
- No refund water
- Energy efficiency
- Improvement of Technical and Financial Performance (APTF)-Water For All Program

It should be noted that since 2020 and with the reform of the sector, the Senegalese Des Eaux (SDE) puts its expertise at the service of water supply in rural areas and the realization of infrastructure works with the objective of the satisfaction and well-being of the populations.

SODECI, since its creation in 1959, has been working to provide the Ivorian population with sustainable solutions for access to drinking water and sanitation services, whether in urban or rural areas.

Remember that the strength of the group is to allow the development of local expertise articulated around training and innovation.

## PANELS ON RELIGIONS AND THE RIGHT TO WATER FOR ALL



**A high level dialogue  
between different  
religions and  
stakeholders**

The session «Religions and the Right to Water for All» was organized by CARITAS Senegal with the collaboration of Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and the Holy See's Dicastery for Integral Human Development.

The session was presented in two panels. The first panel was composed of Imam Ahmadou Makhtar Kante of the Point E Mosque, Archbishop Benjamin Ndiaye of Dakar, and Mr. Noumo Mane, a doctoral student at Assane Seck University in Ziguinchor. The second panel was composed of Cardinal Michael Czerny S.J., Prefect ad Intérim of the Dicastery, Abbe Alphonse Seck, Secretary General, Caritas Senegal, Mr. Mohammed Ahmed Sneiba, Director General of the Senegal Office of the NGO Aid Direct, and Professor Pedro Arrojo Agudo, United Nations Special Rapporteur on the human rights to water and sanitation.

The first panel was moderated by Dr. Fatimatou Sall, CRS Program Manager and the second panel by Mr. Tebaldo Vinciguerra, Official of the Department for Integral Human Development.

After the members of the first panel traced the place of water in the different religions and holy books and practices - Muslim, Christian and local beliefs, the second panel dealt with the problem of water in the modern world. Cardinal Michael Czerny decried the «commodification» of water by pointing to the bottled water that is being distributed throughout the Forum. The Cardinal saw it as a failure of our civilization to provide universal and equitable access to water and sanitation, which is considered a human right. But this right is confronted with the fact that it is considered a «secondary» right that is not «justiciable».

All the panelists also reported on the problems that the populations -particularly rural populations- face with the privatization of water services in these areas -the boreholes and other water system installations. For the panelists, while the private sector is necessary to address the challenges of managing and financing water systems, the private sector is

not philanthropic and the vulnerable are at the mercy of the operators - if not continue to cry out the same cry of Jesus on the Cross, «I am thirsty».



Despite the problems and challenges, the panelists were unanimous in noting that the Forum also presented solutions to these challenges - technological and institutional solutions that need to be put into practice rather than just talked about and exposed. The biggest challenge remains that of water governance, the solution to which is and remains closer cooperation between the public and private sectors, communities and all those dedicated to solving the problem of access to water and sanitation. Professor Pedro Araujo Agudo made a poignant call for this session to be the beginning of a high level dialogue that can lead to cooperation and coordination between different religions and stakeholders. This can be done by organizing during each World Water Day coordinated messages between the different religions that will be issued together to raise awareness on the issues and the search and application of concrete solutions



# WATER SECTOR REFORM

*The President of the World Bank interested in the Senegalese experience*

David Malpass, President of the World Bank interested by the senegalese experience in water reforms Mr. David Malpass President of the World Bank visited the Bank's stand at the World Water Forum in Dakar. On this occasion, Mr. Malpass discussed with the Bank's team on the solutions provided throughout the world to strengthen water security, in particular through the integrated water resources management and the promotion of sanitation through the circular economy approaches. He was particularly interested in the Senegalese experience in terms of water sector reforms and universal access to drinking water supply, especially in rural areas.
